A VISIT FROM STEVE CAINE: (your editor invited Steve to weigh in on living with the current pandemic in Florida)

Hi from your southern BHBL Rotary club representatives in Coconut Grove, Miami, FI. At Gini's request I am happy to report of the goings on locally and how we are handling the situation. Like you, we are sheltered in



place. Everything but the essentials is closed, including golf courses. Ugh! The mayor has established a curfew from 10pm – 5am. The governor has mandated a statewide stay at home order. Miami is heating up the number of Coronavirus cases, but hospitals at this time have adequate capacity. Nancy and I live on the 17t floor of a condo so must take an elevator. Only those living together can get on the elevator at one time. The gym and pool in our building are closed. Volunteerism is starting to blossom. A lady in our building is making face masks and people are complying with the CDC recommendation to wear face masks. Local Rotary Clubs are starting to give more cash to local food banks to feed children and families who need help.

RICHARD ARTHUR – Artificial Intelligence and Machine Collaborating with People

Rick presented a wide ranging overview with slides of a complex and fascinating subject, much of which is new to most of us. He told us that artificial intelligence, machines and people are all collaborators. It's an innovation ecosystem used worldwide by GE where safety is critical and expensive. When equipment shuts down, AI sensors/data keep it running longer. He explained that the world is volatile, complex, uncertain and ambiguous. Using AI in problem solving, risk and cost are reduced. Its goal is problem solving. It begins with a mental model built to share, externalize. Manufacturing, now primarily digital, uses AI based on modeling. Speaking about modeling, Rick said, "AII models are wrong but some are useful." Software, simulation and modeling are used to run scenarios to learn what will happen in the real world. It allows us to design and use machines faster and in more complex ways. AI is machine learning. Machines are great collaborators with repetitive tasks, good with consistency; they are concurrent and complex and have precise, fast turnaround. They are most efficient when they have a lot of data. An example is self-driving cars.
