Amazing Alice Lon Penna

"A small group of thoughtful and committed people can change the world". Thus, started an outstanding presentation by Lon Penna describing an expansive Niskayuna Rotary Global Grant initiative for the betterment of girls, and thus society as a whole, and an amazing rag to riches story of a little Nigerian girl who truly exemplifies the best of humanity.

After catching us up on the great work Helen Penna was doing with "Mooncatcher", to be discussed later, in Malawi, and other African countries, Lon provided a description of the crying need for his project. He did so, by describing some reasons for our changing global environment, and their effects – warming, sea rise, deforestation, exploding population, cities disappearing, vast migration of people, instabilities and increased poverty. He encouraged us to watch a Netflix film, "Life on our Planet," produced by David Attenborough.

Lon then segued into describing the elements of the Nigerian project and how it related to helping our environment and humanity. The elements are: 1. Mooncatcher – donating a reusable means to remove the stigma of menstruation in young school girls, which allows them to stay in school and get an education, 2. enhancing girls' education by providing Micro SD cards pre-loaded with a K-12 curriculum and vocational training, and 3. though not part of the grant, encouraging folks to donate to micro loans through a website such as Kiva.org. Lon spelled out how educated women in countries like Nigeria can help their families, communities, and the world. This was followed by a detailed description of Mooncatcher.

Interlaced throughout the presentation was the inspiring story of Alice Marcus, how she stared in abject poverty in Nigeria, how she was helped and how she is now a member of the Niskayuna Rotary club, helps her village, and is a major donor to this project.

It is impossible to give adequate justice to this truly outstanding far-reaching briefing and project in one page. Thankfully the slides will be forwarded. Great job Lon.
